



'on yer bike' for National Bike Week 11th - 19th June 2005

It's that time of year when the sun is shining, the nights are lighter and cycling seems like a very good idea. It's also a great way to knock off those extra pounds piled on in the comfort eating winter months.

Whether you are splashing out on a new mean machine or polishing up last year's model, every bike needs a good security solution. D-locks, cable locks and chains are all ideal for bikes and the ranges available offer plenty of choice. Below are a few hints and tips on selecting the ideal lock for your bike:

- Cable locks are a great lightweight security solution with a self-coiling nature that ensures they fit easily on to bikes. Cables can be self-locking or require a padlock. Sterling cables (ssp from £4.99) come with protective sleeving to avoid scratching shiny bike surfaces.
- If all good intentions go wrong and the bicycle becomes motorised then the security measure will need to be tougher. Chains secured with a padlock are ideal for securing scooters and motorbikes. Sterling security chains are designed with a special link at each end to cater for padlocks.



- A D-lock is a good solid security solution for any bicycle. Ensure the lock is linked through the frame and the wheel, as well as the securing fixture. Sterling D-locks (ssp from £8.99) are hardened and have a double bolted mechanism for extra piece of mind.
- If there is no obvious fixture to secure your bike to, a security anchor can be permanently attached to a wall, shed or even the ground. Cable and chains can then be secured with a Sterling Padlock. Sterling security anchors start from ssp £13.99.
